

DISTRICT ATTORNEY KIRKE ADAMS PRESS RELEASE

Probation Hearings were held today in Dale County before the Honorable Judge Quattlebaum. District Attorney Kirke Adams stated that the following Defendants were denied probation and were remanded to the Department of Corrections for execution of their sentence.

Glen Ray Nobles, from Daleville, Alabama, was charged with Felony DUI was sentenced to 3 years in prison and fined \$4,100 for his fifth DUI offense.

Donnie Ray Newman, from Ozark, Alabama, plead guilty to Possession of Controlled Substance - Cocaine and Possession of Marijuana was sentenced to 12 months to prison on a split sentence and required to complete the Department of Corrections Substance Abuse Program prior to further consideration for probation.

Kevin Shipman, from Ozark, Alabama, plead guilty to Assault 2nd was sentenced to 3 years in prison and was remanded to the Department of Corrections to serve his sentence.

Stanley Cooper, Jr., from Ozark, Alabama, a co-defendant of Kevin Shipman, also plead to Assault 2nd and was sentenced to 3 years in prison and was remanded to the Department of Corrections to serve his sentence.

Kenneth Jerome Floyd, from Ozark, Alabama, plead guilty to Possession of Controlled Substance - Methamphetamine received a split sentence of 18 months and was remanded to the Department of Corrections to begin his sentence and will be considered for future probation on successful completion of the Department of Corrections Substance Abuse Program.

Charles Leon Davis, from Geneva, Alabama, was found guilty by a Dale County Jury of Assault 2nd and Criminal Mischief 1st Degree and received a split sentence of 3 years and was remanded to the Department of Corrections to begin his sentence.

David Berry Joiner, from Ozark, Alabama, was found guilty by a Dale County Jury of Felony Failure to Comply with the Criminal Notification Act for sex offenders and was sentenced to 3 years and ordered remanded to the Department of Corrections to begin serving his sentence.

District Attorney Kirke Adams said that many people don't see results from the pleas that are made and the cases that are tried during our criminal jury terms. "Our office is dedicated to seeing these cases through and insuring the public that the crimes don't go unpunished. The people that were sent to prison today are off the streets of Dale County and our citizens are safer."
